## LANDSCAPE COMMITTEE REPORT

Recently, you received a report from the Landscape Committee. The following should bring you up-to-date on the activities planned for the immediate future.

Over the past several months, the Landscaping Committee and the Board have worked to develop a plan to address the health and welfare of the trees and landscaping in our neighborhood. We have enlisted the opinions of two arborist and have drawn-up a plan of action for both short-range and long-term care of our trees.

The first phase of this plan, representing tasks requiring immediate attention, has been approved by the Board and communicated to the contractor. As work progresses on the trees, we will notify residents of the approximate

schedules for each activity (e.g., spraying, pruning) so you can plan to park your vehicles elsewhere to avoid potential damage from falling branches and fungicidal/mite sprays. We will notify you of any schedule changes due to inclement weather.

In addition, we have met with our landscaping contractor to discuss areas where we expect improved service in the care of our lawns and shrubs. The response to our complaints will be watched closely. If immediate and continued improvement is not evident, we will take appropriate action.

Last, we are currently working on some long-range plans for the replacement of shrubs that are overgrown and unable to be pruned back in an aesthetic and healthy manner.
