Recycle update

The City's Recycle Division has contracted with a waste management company that does not require residents to separate recycled material. The City however still requires residents to separate paper and plastic in the event it contracts with a different waste management company in the future. Please water your plants!

Trees and shrubs are some of Tollgate's greatest assets. In order to preserve our older trees and newly planted shrubs, regular watering is necessary during these extremely dry summer months. We are in the middle of a yearlong drought with rainfall 8 inches below normal.

Watering guidelines vary depending on the age of the plant. Newly planted trees and shrubs should be watered on average 1-2 times a week, and established trees and shrubs need a thorough soaking once a week. Deep watering is preferable to frequent light watering because light watering encourages the roots to grow close to the surface where the soil will dry out quickest.

Watering should occur in the morning rather than mid-day or evening. Mid-day watering can evaporate while nighttime watering invites disease.

Due to increased water rates, creative watering options are available. Use a clean milk jug to collect running water from a sink or shower while waiting for the hot water. Cisterns can collect rainwater from the roof to water plants or wash a car. See more ideas at <u>www.rainbarrel.net</u>.
